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# Lackman - Thompson House Can it be saved?

There has been considerable media activity recently about the status of this historic 100 year old farm house located adjacent to Lackman Ave and College Blvd. The property was initially donated to the Johnson County Community College. The College recently indicated that they do not have the funds to renovate the building but they are interested in seeing it restored and maintained as an historic property.

The Lackman-Thompson House is one of the few Johnson County historic houses that is on the Kansas Register of Historic Places. LHS President Bob Lillie in expressing the strong interest of the Historical Society in preserving this property said "This is one of the most, if not the most, architecturally significant houses in Lenexa."

The Lenexa Chamber of Commerce is looking into the feasibility of relocating their offices to the Lackman -Thompson House. This would be a way to maintain the property and provide an interesting work space for the Chamber.

This approach of combining a historic building with a commercial enterprise also provides a way to financially provide for the maintenance of a historic building. Hopefully the current proposal or a similar venture will result in the preservation of this landmark building.

#### Flat Rock Dedication Reenactment

A special reenactment of the survey techniques used at the turn of the century and today will be held in the area of Pflumm and 103rd Street on **Saturday, April 27th at 9:30 a.m**.

Members of the KC Metro Survey Reenactors will dress in period costume and use 1890's type survey equipment to locate the survey marker at the Rock Creek Crossing area of the Santa Fe Trail. They will then use modern satellite locating equipment to also locate the same area marker. This demonstration will be very interesting to watch and to compare the old and the new techniques of surveying.

Plans are for the Lenexa Historical Society and the Lenexa Park and Rec Dept. to participate in the activities. The LHS membership is invited to attend.

# Written History

Excerpts from the October 28,1904 edition of the Spring Hill New Era newspaper is an interesting glimpse into the writing style of turn of the century papers as well as a sketch of an early Lenexa resident. The article begins with the heading -

#### S.B. HASKIN, THE COMING MAN.

"The comparatively limited acquaintance of the people of Johnson county with S.B. Haskin, the Republican nominee for representative of this county, excuses us for giving a brief word picture of him and his attainments at this time. In personal appearance he is of medium height and will weigh about 150 pounds. His manners are simple and cordial. In conveysation he is peculiarly agreeable. He does not gamble or drink, and has an aversion to deceit and corruption no matter where it is found. With frankness, heartiness, human sympathies and sanguine hopefulness, he has strong personal influence over those who come in contact with him. This is S. B. Haskin as you will find him throughout the campaign and while preforming his duties as representative."

The article continues with family history - "...son of Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Haskin, of Lenexa, was born in Johnson county in 1872...."

and his education- "...rudiments of an education at the Mt.Zion school...[completed]...at the early age of fourteen years. The next year he went to Baker University, where he completed the clasical course in 1893, and was soon after assigned to the chair of mathmatics in the Marmaduke Military Institute in Sweet Springs, Mo., where he did efficient work for three years. reading law during his vacations. He was admitted to the bar in Saline county, Missouri, in 1896, and went at once to Ann Arbor to take a two year's course, graduating from the law department of that noted school in 1898, and in November of that same year came to his home in Johnson county. In the spring of 1895 he received the Master's degree pro merito in Political Science from Baker University, January 8, 1901, he married to Miss Maud Vigour, youngest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. S. Vigour."

The final paragraph concludes with an endorsement most politicians today would welcome! "...Our legislature needs timber like Mr. Haskin. Johnson county will be ably and honestly represented by him and we predict that when he has served his first term his constituents will say "it is enough, go up higher." There are none better than Haskin for county representative."

Note: The spelling is as written in the original article.

## Strang Pictures

Eight new William B. Strang Electric Line pictures associated with his early Johnson County transportation efforts will be placed in the Wiedenmann (Strang Waiting Station) building. They are currently on display in the Legler Barn Museum. A note of thanks to Vance Carns who constructed the frames and mounted the pictures.

Thanks also to Bob Rose and Norm Keech who together with Vance Carns have been the prime "reconstructors" of the waiting station; taking it from a dilapidated building to its present pristine. state. The building and picture exhibit to be displayed within the building makes an interesting addition to the Museum complex and the Park.

## 1890's News Clips

(reprinted by the Lenexa News, circa 1900 - 1910)

- 1890 Census of Lenexa 185 souls (1990's there are over 37,000 people!)
- **1891** There are 40 pupils enrolled in the Lenexa School District #46.

(Today, there over 3000 students attending seven schools in Lenexa.)

1892 - Lenexa townsman, Henry Caenen, possesses an old horse pistol found on the battlefield of Waterloo.

> The Ladies Aid Society of the Methodist-Episcoal Church will serve a supper Wednesday evening at the home of Mrs. H.D. Gillette, 9344 Second Street. Come one, Come all! Supper is 10 cents.

- 1893 Every true Kansan and especially farmers of Johnson County will take pride in the fact that our county took first premium on corn at the Chicago World's Fair.
- 1894 Ross Allen, 98th and Fourth Street, early settler related he came through Kansas City and Fort Leavenworth in1847.....
  Kansas City had one house and Leavenworth was a wilderness.
- Circa 1900 Three young women were killed at the railroad crossing at 87th Street.


  This made a total of 9 deaths at this crossing following which the railroad constructed the first viaduct in Lenexa.

1895 - Allen's Wood's (98th Street south to 103rd Street on the east side of Fourth Street - now Pflumm Rd ) was the site of a 35-tent Camp Meeting. 800 people attended the Sunday Service.

Squire Moore's bees produced more than half a ton of honey this season. (It is believed that he was the owner of a portion of the current Sar-Ko-Par Trails Park site.)

The Mohawk Indian Medicine Co. is here for a 2-week engagement. Try a bottle, it won't hurt you.
