**Program:** 7:30. "Indians That Shaped Early Days of Lenexa and Wyandotte County's Delaware and Wyandot Indians," presented by Charles Goslin.

LHS members and friends will be privileged to hear Charles Goslin, retired Hallmark illustrator, student of archeology, and local Kansas and Missouri history, speak at the LHS General/Dinner meeting here on the grounds of the Museum.

Charles has become a well-known and prolific painter of historic events in both Kansas and Missouri. He received a degree in fine arts from the Kansas City Art Institute and School of Design in 1954. The following murals are among his many accomplishments:

- Shawnee Indian Mission at the Johnson County Museum of History, Shawnee
- Historic Mission, Mission, KS
- 1856 Sinking of the Arabia Steamboat at the Steamboat Arabia Museum, KCMO
- Historic Shawnee, Shawnee, KS City Hall
- Santa Fe in 1846, National Frontier Trails Center, Independence, MO
- Scott's Bluff-Oregon Trail, National Trails Frontier Center, Independence, MO

His most recent work is the nearly 10 X 22-foot mural at the Kansas State Historical Society's Hollenberg Station State Historic Site, Hanover, (Washington County) Kansas near the Nebraska line. He was chosen from 50 artists to depict this scene that includes a Pony Express rider, a wagon trail, travelers on the Oregon Trail, and cavalymen mounted on horseback. The mural employed models from the Hanover community and is entitled "A Parade of History on the Oregon Trail by Hollenberg Station."

Charles is bringing a new dimension to the history of our area in his golden years of retirement. He is a native of Columbia, Missouri. He and his wife, Liz, are currently residents of Edwardsville, Kansas.
