
Greg Peterson to Present "Advertising Item Collection" at March Meeting

## Letter From Kiersten

Lately, I have had a lot of members asking why we need **Artifact Preservation Storage areas** for the museum. In this issue, I will take the opportunity to explain the answers to these questions. Next month, I will answer the other question I often get, "Why are all the exhibits changing?"

In the museum profession, there are a few **basic "standards" regarding collections care**. Collections are those items (in our case, our cultural heritage) that museums collect and preserve for generations to come. Because of the incredibly harsh effects of light, air pollution (yes, even in Lenexa), handling, and fluctuating temperature/humidity, the preservation of artifacts on exhibit is automatically compromised by the simple act of putting them on display. If a museum (or anyone) wants to keep items intact for years to come, the best thing to do is put them into preservation storage. The ideal place is in archivally safe containers with very little light exposure, set in a stable climate.

Another related "standard" is to have, at the most, **only 10 percent of your collection on exhibit at any one time**, precisely because of the reasons outlined above. The other 90 percent can be stored in preservation storage where segments of it can be exhibited on a rotation basis or used for research purposes.

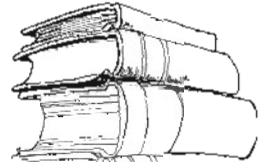
When we, as a museum, show that we are making a concerted effort towards preserving our cultural heritage, many **opportunities** can open up for us. More **grants** will be available, **monetary donations** will be more plentiful, and **visitors** from the local community will have something to come back for since exhibits change once in awhile. And last, but not least, we will be able to **share our precious heritage** with people generations down the line.

## Book Review

*From the Barn's Gift Shop*



*Trail of Thread* series, by Linda K. Hubalek of Lindsborg, Kansas. Reviewed by Mary Kay Smith.

The author follows her maternal ancestors who traveled to Kansas in the 1850s. Written in the form of letters, she describes the experience pioneer women faced before and during the Civil War.

**Book I. *Trail of Tears: A Woman's Westward Journey. 1854-1855.*** The author's great-great-great grandmother, Deborah Goodpaster Pieratt travels by wagon train from Kentucky to the new territory of Kansas in 1854.

**Book II. *Thimble of Soil: A Woman's Quest for Land. 1854-1860.*** Widowed Margaret Ralston Kennedy brings eight of her children and their families from Ohio to Kansas in 1855, to stake a claim during the troubled times of "bleeding Kansas."

**Book III. *Stitch of Courage: A Woman's Fight for Freedom. 1861-1865.*** Mrs. Kennedy's orphaned niece, Maggie, follows her family to Kansas and marries Deborah Pieratt's son, James. Maggie's letters tell about the demons faced by women during the Civil War.

The historical fiction, which is based on diligent research is highly recommended. It is available for purchase in the Gift Shop of the Legler Barn Museum. Each volume is \$9.95 plus tax.
