

Rotating Exhibit Schedule

 October 2-November 22: From Far Away Russia: Russian Germans in Kansas, with video "From the Volga to the High Plains, Germans from Russia in Western Kansas."

Join us for this pictorial exhibit sponsored by the Kansas State Historical Society and the Kansas Humanities Council. Threatened with military conscription and the loss of economic privileges, thousands of Germans left Russia in the 1870s just as they had left war-torn Germany for Russia's unsettled agricultural provinces a century earlier. With the railroads advertising land for sale in Kansas, many Russian-Germans responded. They sought good farm land with convenient access to markets via the rails. An added attraction was exemption from military service on religious grounds. By 1879, 12,000 Russian-Germans lived in the state.

November 28-January 24, 1999: Kids' International Corner.

Kids' International Corner is a common tribute to peace. Each item has been donated from its country of origin to this travelling exhibit and each has been given in the name of a child in hope of a future enriched by global freedom. The exhibit was put together by the Greater Kansas City Ethnic Enrichment Commission. Opening day features an open house celebration.

 January 30-March 21, 1999: Wow! That Oughta be in a Museum!

What do erasers, orchids, and obituaries have in common? They're all things that Kansans collect! Both people and museums are driven by the same collecting impulse, but they often have different goals. This exhibit features collectors and museums from all over Kansas through colorful photographs and interesting accounts. It explores the human drive to accumulate things while spotlighting some amazing Kansas collections. Opening day will be a celebration of local collections and their collectors. Bring in your collection to show and tell with our guests. Join us for this pictorial exhibit sponsored by the Kansas State Historical Society and the Kansas Humanities Council.

 April 3-May 23, 1999: Pinnacles of the Plains: Public Sculpture in Kansas.

The Heartland Spinach Festival was as great as usual, and we quilters had a good time collecting donations for the Lenexa Historical Society. Our gorgeous quilt, "Floral Fantasy," was won by Caroll Irnin of Adrian, MO. She displays quilts at shows and intends to add her lovely prize to her showings. We thank you all for your support and wish we could give each and every one of our supporters one of our beauties. This year's profits on our quilt was \$1797, and all of our funds are earmarked for future expansion of the Historical Society's museum complex.

We quilters have had a couple of low blows recently because we have lost two of our much-loved members. Kathy Schamberger, my co-chairman, was killed in an auto accident on August 13 at the Amana Colonies in Iowa. She was there to help her ill parents. Kathy was a brilliant and imaginative quilt designer with a delightful wit who was fun to be around.

Marj Roberts died on September 17, succumbing to cancer. She was an expert at several crafts and did all the cross-stitching on this year's Spinach quilt. She was also a fun addition to our group and wonderful joke teller. We remember with love these precious women!

Memorial services were held on September 27 for Majorie Roberts at the Regent's Walk Club House in Overland Park, She died September 17 in Shawnee, KS Majorie, formerly of Brandon, Florida, moved to Johnson County in 1991 and joined the Legler Barn Quilters soon thereafter. She was the sister of Sue Locher, LHS member, and long-time member of the Legler Barn Quilters' group.

# What is the "Historic Places Program"?

Our Lenexa Historical Society is beginning a program designating certain homes, houses or structures for public recognition as an historic place in Lenexa. The owners would agree to having an appropriate plaque affixed to the property in a visible location, and to maintain the property with ongoing maintenance. LHS will make a public presentation to the owners indicating the history of the property. The owners also agree to inform LHS of any proposed reasonable changes to the structure and to changes in ownership.

Five places in Lenexa have been outlined to

become "Lenexa Historic Places": Holy Trinity Church (Chapel), 9138 Pflumm; the Haskin house at 94th Terrace and Pflumm; the Lackman/Thompson Home at 111th and Lackman; Virginia Hutton's building, formerly the Crockett Bit and Spur Co. at 18880 W. 87th State and the Merle and Elaime Sparlin; home at 9318 Noland Rd.

To be chosen, a site must meet certain conteria and be within Lenexa city limits. If anyone knows of a site that sounds the it would be a good candidate, call Rita 894-2825 or Frank Andrews, 894-1376.
