## November Honors U.S. Military Veterans

War has been a grim and sad part of our country's history, and Lenexa has not escaped its call. Many Lenexans have served in our nation's military branches.

The "Johnson County Herald" printed a list of men who were recalled to active duty in Korea. The list appeared on April 12, 1951. What follows is an excerpt from that article.

"Thirty-two men from Northeast Johnson County who are members of the 758 Field Artillery Battalion will be activated May 1 with the battalion. They are to report to Fort Bragg, North Carolina, where they will undergo more training. The men from this area [Lenexa] who are recalled are:

Sgt. Earl F. Stolbert  
 Sgt. Robert B. Newcomer  
 Sgt. Fred C. Ryckert  
 Cpl. Robert H. Hennigh  
 Pvt. Charles L. Blackwell  
 Pvt. James H. Blackwell  
 Pvt. Donald E. Morris  
 Pvt. Marvin O. Sherfey"

The recall of these men was made all the

more poignant, frustrating, and frightening because many of them still carried the horrific memories of having survived World War II, which had ended just six years earlier.

Imagine being the man who, once again, had to face the conditions of living near battle fields and the possibility of death every day. Imagine the women who loved those men, once again saying goodbye at the bus or train station, once again living through each long day, sometimes alone, and praying their loved ones were safe. Those women and men, in the words of Patrick Henry's famous speech on patriotism, "deserve the love and respect of every man and woman." Amen!

## November Honors U.S. Military Veterans

### World War I Hero



Isadore Hoehn spent all of his life in Lenexa and left for the U. S. Army on Sept. 17, 1917. He spent six weeks in Camp Funston, Junction City, KS. He then went to Fort Sill, OK, and left in May 1918 for France. He was in the 137th Infantry of the 35th Division. He was killed on Sept. 26, 1918 in the Battle of the Argonne. He was the only soldier from Lenexa killed in World War I.
