## Clarence Schweiger House is Razed

The Schweiger House on the southeast corner of 87th Street and Pflumm was razed in late December 2000. The pretty stone and brick two-story house had stood there since 1933, when Clarence and Theresa built it on their dairy farm.

Clarence was born in 1904 in the white farm house on the northwest comer of 87th and Pflumm. It was destroyed when 87th was widened to a four-lane street in 1984. The silo and barns followed soon after.


In 1931, Clarence bought the quarter section (160 acres) west of Pflumm between 79th and 83rd. The dairy farm he was later to establish was on this land. In addition, he bought 60 acres between 83rd and 87th. Clarence and Theresa operated the Crystal Springs Farm Dairy until selling it in 1962.

The Schweigers built their four-bedroom house out of Lenexa stone. The beautiful stone fireplace in the living room certainly gave the stone mason his exercise. He had to cut the stones in the walk-out basement, then carry them upstairs.

Ten children were raised in the snug stone house: Joseph, Helen, Tom, Barbara, Carl, Mary, Clarence, Dorothy, Bernard, and Joan.

After selling the dairy, Clarence and Theresa kept the stone house and four acres. When development encroached and 87th Street became too noisy, they built another house at 13507 W. 82nd Street in 1985.

An interesting story about John Schweiger, Clarence's dad: When John was clearing brush on his land, he was surprised to come upon a small shack near the spring that ran on the property. It was occupied by a bearded, balding man in his 50s who gave his name as only "Old Dad." John allowed him to stay, and Old Dad sometimes worked on the farm.
